Inappropriate Park Usage	We continue to discover bike ramps, swings, etc. in the park. We have retained an attorney who is advising us on appropriate action. We will make sure the rules and regulations are posted at the entrance to the park. As I have mentioned numerous times in communication to members, Wes Miller Park is a nature preserve. Our obligation is to keep it as pristine and as natural as possible while at the same time, enabling our members to have a peaceful place for a walk, a picnic or even a wedding. How long will it take the delicate ecosystem to be destroyed if trail bikes proliferate?
Watershed Management	We have partnered for several years with the Watershed Management Group. Catlow Shipek attended our March board meeting and we continue to explore ways we can work together to enhance the flow of Sabino Creek and also reduce erosion and runoff and harvest rainwater in Hidden Valley. Neighborhood Watch

NW Meeting The Neighborhood Watch meeting at Wes Miller Park on March 11 was attended by all but 2 of the block leaders and 28 residents. block Leaders met 1/2 an hour prior to the meeting of the all Hidden Valley residents. **Pima Sheriff News** Lieutenant Jess Copfer from the Pima county Sheriff Rincon District attended along with Sergeant Manalois. They discussed the importance of a Strong Neighborhood Watch Program. Neighbors who are alert to what is going on in their neighborhood are essential to the safety of us all. The Sheriff told us that they have a used medication disposal drop off at the Rincon Station on Tanque Verde and Bear Canyon Road. They also have a number of gun safety locks for those folks who do not have them. Both the med disposal and gun locks are free for your use. The office is open Monday-Friday 8:00 to 4:30. Do not take sharps to the station but contact your Doctor or pharmacy for instructions on disposal. There is rarely an officer on duty at the Rincon station and you will be met by administrative staff. He urged everyone to use 911. When you encounter any situation that makes you uncomfortable please report it before it becomes a crime. He urged Neighborhood Watch Leaders to be careful of their own safety and not confront possible criminals but report them to the police. He told us to inform our neighbors when we are on vacation and that the Auxiliary Police will do a check when you alert them if you are going to be gone 2 weeks or more. Suspicious Just this week we had an incident of a hispanic male who approached two **Rehavior** homeowners on Hummingbird Lane. He asked for work. He introduced himself as Carlos from Puerto Rico. He is a tall thin male who wears braids and has been seen in a baseball cap and athletic gear or more recently in a white rough cotton over shirt. He has a quarter size tattoo on his left cheek just under his eye. He has been spotted by several residents on and around Snyder and Moonstone. Our concern is that most legitimate contractors will have references with them and a business card and contact information. My wife was very uncomfortable when he approached her in the yard offering to do any number of contracting chores for free if she would give him a list of her contacts and show his work. She did not agree. She called the sheriff to report the incident as did many other residents. Good Work!. **Park Issues** There have been a number of sightings in Wes Miller Park of people who are not HOA members. There has been vandalism and unapproved construction and destruction. Do not put yourself in danger but you can ask if they are a member of the HOA. Take a picture of license plates and call 911 so they can trace the plate.

"POOPER SCOOPER" LAW

Solid animal waste left on public or private property without the permission of the property owner is unlawful.

This code can be difficult to enforce since the violation needs to be observed by a law enforcement officer for a citation to be issued. However, citizens may have a Third Party Citation issued by calling Pima Animal Care.

In Tucson and Green Valley: 724-5900 or fax: 724-5960 In Ajo: 387-7502

Please provide the following information when reporting a violation:

- photograph documenting the incident, including the date, location, and time of the incident;
- the animal must be clearly identifiable in the photograph;
- · the animal owner's address must be known and provided;
- the complainant must be willing to testify in court;
- if two independent witnesses from separate addresses are willing to testify, a photograph may not be required.

Firewise Undate



Want to save money on your homeowners insurance? Some companies are giving discounts to homeowners who have had their homes inspected and are part of a Firewise Community. We are renewing our efforts to become a Firewise Community. Firewise is a program administered through the National Forestry Service.



It is especially important to those of us who live in wildfire country. The topography of our neighborhood and our hot climate and fierce winds make Firewise essential to the well being of our families and pets, property and the community at large.



What can you do to assure that you are living as safely as you can on the property you own? Schedule a Firewise Inspection. I serve at your invitation only and all of the recommendations I make are strictly voluntary compliance on your part. You can take my suggestions and I hope you do act on them, or you can decide not to take advantage of making your property as safe as you can from the dangers of wildfire. Most fixes are free or at very little cost.

I am a certified Firewise inspector for our neighborhood. Although I wish everyone was a member of the Hidden Valley Homeowners Association it isn't the case. But just like Neighborhood Watch, Firewise is here to help you keep your property safe.

If you were at the Neighborhood Watch/ Firewise/Community development meeting on March 25 you had the opportunity to sign up for a Firewise assessment. Unfortunately someone picked up the sign up sheet and I lost half of the names of the folks who wish to have an assessment. If you inadvertently picked up signup sheets please let me know and I will be happy to come and get them. If you signed up for an assessment and have not heard from me yet please contact me so that I can come by and make an assessment of your property. I will be assessing the outside of your home and your property. I will not be checking the inside of your home.

An assessment takes about 20 minutes to complete. When I am through I will give you a copy of my report and we can discuss how you can be part of the solution to the wildfire problem.



Lastly, but very importantly, many of you brought your kids to see Smokey the Bear in the park. Unfortunately he got sent out on the rig to respond to an emergency during our meeting. We will try to get him back for the picnic on April 8th. Smokey wanted me to thank all of you for turning out to see how you could keep your neighborhood safe.


Social Committee News
